

Minnesota State Mankato Names Dr. Christopher Brown Founding Dean of College of Humanities and Social Sciences as of July 1, 2022

Minnesota State University, Mankato President Edward Inch announced on July 1, 2022 that Dr. Christopher Brown will serve as the founding dean of the University's newly formed College of Humanities & Social Sciences.

After a yearlong planning process, the Colleges of Arts & Humanities and Behavioral & Social Sciences officially combined July 1 as the College of Humanities and Social Sciences to provide students with more interdisciplinary programs and experiential learning opportunities. President Inch said all the academic programs and employees in the colleges of Arts and Humanities and Social and Behavioral Sciences will transition to be part of the new college.

The Mahkato Wacipi memorializes the Dakota 38 massacre that occurred 160 years ago, the largest mass execution in United States history.

GEOGRAPHY

Dr. Phillip Larson Among 9 Lead Scientists from 5 Universities Awarded \$2.8 Million NSF Grant



Dr. Phil Larson, Director of the Minnesota State Mankato's Earth Science Programs, in collaboration with the University of Minnesota, the University of Wisconsin-Superior, the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and Harvard University, submitted and were rewarded a National Science Foundation Frontier Research in Earth Sciences (NSF FRES) proposal. The award total is \$2.8 million, with Minnesota State Mankato's portion at ~\$705k.

This work includes funds to support (to varying degrees) three graduate students working in the EARTH Systems Laboratory, EARTH Systems Lab Geospatial Research Data Manager Andy Brown, and extensive field data collection and laboratory analysis necessary to complete the work proposed. This project will focus on many different Earth Science questions related to glacial history, glacial ice-flow dynamics on fresh water, glacial isostatic rebound over a geologic rift, lake level fluctuations controlling bedrock river incision and drainage basin development (base level), and much more. The geographic focus of the work is focused on Lake Superior and the rivers and landscapes surrounding it.

Graduate Student Alumni Kenzie Shandonay's Processes and Landforms Publication

Former M.S. student Kenzie Shandonay, who is now a Ph.D. student at Arizona State University, published an article on her thesis work in the prestigious journal Processes and Landforms entitled, <u>"Morphology and stratigraphy of Aeolian sand stringers in southeast Minnesota and western</u> <u>Wisconsin, USA."</u> The paper also includes faculty members Dr. Mark Bowen and Dr. Larson, as well as Richard Mataitis, another former M.S. student, as co-authors.

Land-use and Climate Impacts on Minnesota's Whitewater River Grant

Dr. Larson, alongside a colleague from the University of Minnesota, also had a recent grant proposal entitled, "Land-use and climate impacts on Minnesota's Whitewater River," to Minnesota's Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund approved for funding and signed off on by Governor Tim Walz. This will fund the work to be conducted, partially fund the EARTH Systems Lab's Geospatial Data Manager Andy Brown, and undergraduate students in Earth Science for the next two years.

Dr. Larson Featured in Climate Change Documentary

Dr. Larson was also featured in the recent documentary by David Ellingson, <u>Headwaters: Kayaking</u> <u>Through Climate Change</u>, created on the upper Mississippi River.

EARTH Systems Lab Receives "Tree Cookie" Donation

A "tree cookie," or slice of a tree, was recently donated to Minnesota State University, Mankato and will be used in the EARTH Systems Laboratory to teach students about climate and dendrochronology. <u>The story was published</u> in *The Free Press* and features Professor Dr. Don Friend.


